Advertisers understand it. They use kids to sell their stuff all the time. Why? Besides being cute, kids look at the world differently than adults. They find hope, joy, peace, and love in the littlest things. How delightful! Growing old is not synonymous with becoming jaded and grumpy. How can we adults reclaim God's good plan by looking through the eyes of a child? What can children teach us about living our faith? How can we be in ministry with children – not in ministry to them?

Guiding scripture: Mark 10: 13-16 (TNIV)

¹³People were bringing little children to Jesus for him to place his hands on them, but the disciples rebuked them.

¹⁴When Jesus saw this, he was indignant. He said to them, "Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of God belongs to such as these. ¹⁵Truly I tell you, anyone who will not receive the kingdom of God like a little child will never enter it." And he took the children in his arms, placed his hands on them and blessed them.

This Scripture challenges us to consider the vulnerability and dependence of children in Jesus' day - not simply childlike faith. What's the difference between childish and childlike?

Scripture: John 6: 1-14 (The Message)

¹After this, Jesus went across the Sea of Galilee (some call it Tiberias).

²A huge crowd followed him, attracted by the miracles they had seen him do among the sick. ³When he got to the other side, he climbed a hill and sat down, surrounded by his disciples. ⁴It was nearly time for the Feast of Passover, kept annually by the Jews.

⁵When Jesus looked out and saw that a large crowd had arrived, he said to Philip, "Where can we buy bread to feed these people?" ⁶He said this to stretch Philip's faith. He already knew what he was going to do.

⁷Philip answered, "Two hundred silver pieces wouldn't be enough to buy bread for each person to get a piece."

⁸One of the disciples—it was Andrew, brother to Simon Peter—said, ⁹"There's a little boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But that's a drop in the bucket for a crowd like this."

Mothers' Day

Scripture: Isaiah 43: 1-2 (TNIV)

¹But now, this is what the LORD says – he who created you, Jacob, he who formed you, Israel: "Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have summoned you by name; you are mine."

² When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and when you pass through the rivers, they will not sweep over you. When you walk through the fire, you will not be burned; the flames will not set you ablaze.

Scripture: Proverbs 3: 5-6 (TNIV)

Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding, ⁶in all your ways submit to him, and he will make your paths straight

¹² For this is what the LORD says:

*FYI: Dandle means to move (a baby or young child) up and down in a playful or affectionate way.

Synopsis: Kids trust parents to catch them when they jump and comfort them when they are sad. A child's trust is a sacred gift given to parents and caregivers that can reflect their trust in God. We know both the pain of broken trust and the importance of trust that is kept.

Felt need: Trust God whose love never fails and whose comfort is always available

¹⁷ But the wisdom that comes from heaven is first of all pure; then peace-loving, considerate, submissive, full of mercy and good fruit, impartial and sincere.

Scripture: Matthew 5: 8 (TNIV)

⁸ Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God.

Scripture: Luke 2: 41-52 (The Message)

⁴¹Every year Jesus' parents traveled to Jerusalem for the Feast of Passover.

Scripture: John 15: 12-15 (NIV - part of May 6 lectionary)

¹² My command is this: Love each other as I have loved you. ¹³ Greater love has no one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends. ¹⁴ You are my friends if you do what I command. ¹⁵ I no longer call you servants, because a servant does not know his master's business. Instead, I have called your friends, for everything that I learned from my Father I have made known to you.

Scripture: Exodus 20: 1-17 (includes Sabbath commandment, which is key to loving God well and loving neighbor well)

¹God said to the people of Israel:

²I am the Lord your God, the one who brought you out of Egypt where you were slaves.

³Do not worship any god except me.

⁴ Do not make idols that look like anything in the sky or on earth or in the ocean under the earth. ⁵ Don't bow down and worship idols. I am the Lord your God, and I demand all your love. If you reject me, I will punish your families for three or four generations. ⁶But if you love me and obey my laws, I will be kind to your families for thousands of generations.

⁷ Do not misuse my name. I am the Lord your God, and I will punish anyone who misuses my name.

⁸ Remember that the Sabbath Day belongs to me. ⁹ You have six days when you can do your work, ¹⁰but the seventh day of each week belongs to me, your God. No one is to work on that day—not you, your children, your slaves, your animals, or the foreigners who live in your towns. ¹¹ In six days I made the sky, the earth, the oceans, and everything in them, but on the seventh day I rested. Message illustration: Heard on WJQ during Lent 2018: Listeners were invited to share their stories of what they have given up for Lent that had "stuck," i.e. the acts that had the most impact. A young mom called in recalling how she had always given up smoking while pregnant, but always found herself smoking shortly after her children were born. One day, her five-year-old son said he wanted to grow up to be a smoker. That was the last day she smoked.

Vicki Corona said that in 1989 when she was writing about dancing and people often quote her when they talk about living life to the fullest, but that sounds pretty trite when we're grieving. What can young (and not so young) children teach us about God's desire for using every day we've been given to find meaning and purpose - and leave a legacy?
